Spring Show Opens

SPC Gallery Exhibits "Academic Nudes"

The Saint Peter's College art gallery opens its spring exhibit this week, featuring a collection of drawings and paintings under the title "The Academic Nude." The 43 works to be displayed are from the 16th through 20th centuries and were donated to the college exhibit by private collectors and galleries.

An academic nude is a drawing or painting done by an artist as either a prelude to a larger work or as an exercise to acquire a skill. Oscar Magnan, S.J., chairperson of the Saint Peter's Fine Arts Department, said not every nude qualifies for that category.

"The artists who produced those drawings or paintings usually conceived them as a preparation either for a more definite work or

simply towards the acquisition of a skill," he explained. "But it frequently happens that those studies have more vitality and more life in them than the final works for which those studies were made."

Internationally-famous artists represented in the exhibit include Degas, Annibale Carracci, Pompeo Batoni, Burne-Jones, John Singer Sargent, Karl Barth, and Bastien-Lepage. The exhibit formally opens April 1 with a reception by invitation only from 6 to 8 p.m. Running through May 5, it will be open to the public Mondays, Tuesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Wednesdays and Thursdays from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. The gallery is located in the O'Toole Library.

Films, Retreats Mark Lenten Season

Campus Ministry's schedule of Lenten events continues this week with films, prayer sessions, and a staff retreat. The film series on women in the church will offer "Feminist Spirituality: Beginnings" with Madonna Kolbenschlag April 2 at noon and 2 p.m. in Campus Ministry's outer office. Another series on the theme of God will feature "The Grand Inquisitor" April 3 at 12:30 p.m. in the Student Senate lounge.

The department will sponsor a retreat for all staff members April 3. The next retreat, scheduled for April 9, is targeted to resident students. Campus Ministry also holds two weekly meditative prayer services that focus on the Sunday readings and personal experiences with God. They're held Fridays at 12:30 p.m. in the college chapel, McDermott Hall and Sundays at 9:30 p.m. in the Christ Chapel in the student residence.

Philosophy Panel

Phi Sigma Tau, the philosophy honor society, will host a panel discussion called "Creation and Evolution" April 1 at noon in the Emeritus Room, Pope Hall. Panelists Dr. Peter Alexander and Dr. Marjorie Collier, both of the Biology Department, will discuss evolution, while Rev. Laurence Cassidy, S.J., of the Philosophy Department will raise questions about natural reason and contemporary views of science. Each panelist will lecture for 10 minutes before fielding questions from the audience.
