CAREER FAIR SUCCESSFUL AGAIN

Nearly 1,000 students took part in the Second Annual Saint Peter's College Career Fair held last Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday in the Pavonia Room when students from virtually every major took time to meet with 40 employers and representatives from 12 graduate and professional schools while planning for their future.

The fair was sponsored by the Business Clubs' Steering Committee, the Class of 1986, and the Career Development Center, under the direction of Dr. William K. Stoms, Jr.

Stoms noted that students who were unable to attend the fair may still benefit from other services provided by Career Development.

For example, Commercial Trust, Ryerson Steel, and the New York Life Insurance Company will be on campus this month interviewing for a variety of entry-level positions. However, Stoms said, student who wish to interview with these companies on campus must make appointments. Those appointment deadlines are this week: Sign-up is required by Thursday for an interview with Commercial Trust and by Friday for interviews with Ryerson and New York Life.

Dr. Stoms reminds students that the Career Development Center, Third Floor of 104 Glenwood, can help with many career decisions. Stop by and make an appointment - it could make a world of difference.

PEAHENS BREAK THROUGH AP'S TOP 20

The Saint Peter's College Women's Basketball team is now ranked as a national power in both the Associated Press Poll and the USA TODAY Top 25. The Peahens broke through the AP's Top 20 with a ranking of 19th while the USA TODAY poll lists the women as 25th in the nation.

Assistant Sports Information Director Diane Jones reports that the women are ranked #1 in the NCAA Division 1 poll in scoring defense, allowing a paltry average of 50.4 points per game. The Peahens, with an undefeated record, are tied with three other Division 1 institutions in won-lost percentage.
