AFRO-AMERICAN SYMPOSIUM....Dr. Samuel Proctor, Martin Luther King Professor at Rutgers University, will be the keynote speaker at a symposium on Afro-American Studies at Noon Wednesday in the Pavonia Dining Room. Dr. Proctor is the former director of the Peace Corps in Africa and also served as the president of two Black colleges. Following his address students and teachers will discuss the role of Afro-American studies at the college.

ORIENTAL LECTURE....Professor Yoshito Hakeda of Columbia University will discuss "Buddhism" at 3 P.M. Wednesday in the Pope Lecture Hall in this week's oriental religious lecture.
