

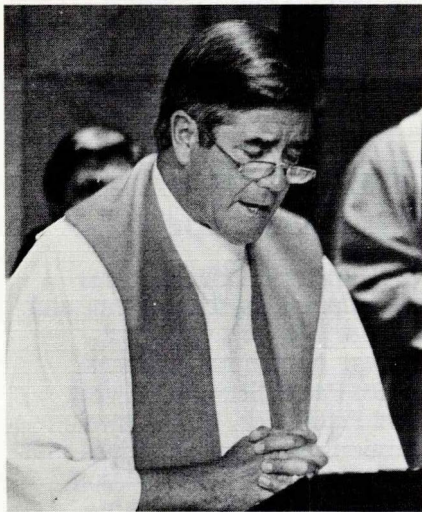

Kelly Resigns Campus Ministry Post; Former Prep Teacher Mullin Joins Staff

After a career at Saint Peter's College that has included a yearbook dedication and recondo training with ROTC members, Joseph A. Kelly, S.J., has decided to resign as director of Campus Ministry to begin studies in marriage and family counseling.

John A. Mullin, S.J., will take over Kelly's post as director of Campus Ministry effective July 1. Currently an assistant in Campus Ministry at Loyola College, Baltimore, Mullin taught at nearby Saint Peter's Prep during his regency period and after his ordination from 1979 to 1986. He was graduated from Brooklyn

Prep and Boston College. He also holds a masters in counseling from Loyola and degrees from Woodstock College.

Kelly will remain at Saint Peter's as assistant in Campus Ministry during his studies. Since joining the Saint Peter's College family in 1968, he has often served the college community above and beyond his Campus Ministry role.

One of those times involved spending four days with the Saint Peter's ROTC unit training at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. The 1985 yearbook staff dedicated its edition to Kelly for his devotion to students.

Day Care Center Plans In Works For Site On SPC Campus

Saint Peter's College may start accepting a few little tikes next year for a new day care center that may open on the Jersey City campus.

The college first considered the plan two years ago, organizing a survey to monitor how much interest the college community had in the idea. "The poll indicated solid support for some sort of child care," said Dr. Patricia Redden, chemistry, one of the center's organizers. "A number of responses indicated that members of the faculty, staff, and student body would take advantage of the opportunity. Now we need to make the idea concrete."

Tentative plans call for a paid professional to operate the center, assisted by students working either

as interns or for work-study pay. Parents would pay for the care, although the center would work on a non-profit basis. Cost hasn't been determined.

Children's ages will probably range from age 2 to kindergarten. Parents will enroll them for a particular period of time, although organizers hope to allow drop-ins during emergencies. First preference will be given to members of the college community.

Peer Advisors Needed To Welcome New Freshmen

The Peer Advisor Program sponsored by the Counseling Center is currently recruiting freshmen, sophomores, and juniors to work with September's incoming freshmen.

They also participate with freshman orientation and conduct year-round programs to meet the needs of new students.

The Saint Peter's Counseling Center conducts summer workshops to prepare peer advisors for this responsibility.

Applicants must be mature, dependable, have leadership potential, strong interpersonal skills, and approximately a 2.5 GPA. Interested students should pick up applications in the Counseling Center before March 11. Faculty and staff members are also encouraged to submit names of qualified students to Patricia Barber, program director. Deadline is Feb. 11.
