PROPHETS AND PROFIT

By now, many of you may have already seen the flyers for the "Prophets and Profit" series that begins here at SPC tomorrow night at 8. The series, which will feature New York Governor Mario M. Cuomo at Noon on April 16 in the College's Recreational Life Center, will center on discussions of the Catholic Bishops' Pastoral Letter on "Catholic Social Teaching and the U.S. Economy."

Part One of the series will feature Rev. John C. Haughey, S.J., Senior Fellow at the Woodstock Theological Center of Georgetown University and a visiting professor at the Seton Hall University Graduate School of Theology and Pastoral Ministry, as guest speaker.

Father Haughey will discuss the traditions and challenges to the Pastoral, which deals with the imbalance between rich and poor due to present economic systems in this country.

The Series will continue on April 11 with Rev. Thomas J. Reese, S.J., an associate editor of America magazine, who will present an analysis of the letter. Governor Cuomo will end the Series for this semester. He will offer a response to the Pastoral. Governor Cuomo recently authored an article for America, "Toward a Consensus" which also dealt with the Pastoral.

As these dates approach additional information will be published in Campus.
