## PRE-CEP MAKES THE GRADE

Saint Peter's Pre-College Enrichment Program (Pre-Cep) was recently presented the Distinguished Project Award by the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities Conference on Minority Affairs. Mr. Bill Reid III, Director of Minority Affairs, accepted the award from Fr. William McInnes, S.J., president of AJCU.

Pre-Cep, a four-year program of academic assistance for high school students, is designed to encourage students to finish high school and attend college.

## SAINT PETER'S OFFERS "THE AFRICANS", A TELEVIDEO COURSE

"The Africans" is a televideo course being offered this Fall by the Afro-American Studies Program and the Evening Session. Students who enroll in this special course will receive college credit for viewing the 9 television programs produced by the Public Broadcasting System (PBS) and meeting in the scheduled follow-up seminars which discuss the issues and concepts depicted in the series. A selection of readings and exercises accompanies the course.

"The Africans" examines African history from its ancient civilizations to the present, focussing on the three major influences on African culture -- indigenous, Islamic and European. It also assesses the contributions of the African culture and the impact of the West on contemporary African society.

The series begins on Thursday, October 9 on WNET Channel 13. The first seminar will meet Friday, October 10.

Dr. Michael Mitchell, Director of the Afro-American Studies Program, will lead the seminars which will meet on the following Friday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m.: October 10 and 24, November 7 and 21, December 5, 12 and 19.
